Furthermore, it is a delight to see the addition of Molly to the reading rota at St. Lawrence too. Our children and young people are really stepping up and stepping out with their contributions. Not to mention our tech wizard William, without his knowledge and expertise on our tech team, we would be lost! Thank you to all of you for your contributions, long may it continue!

Our Community Christmas Tree project was a wonderful way to share prayer within our town, and it was encouraging to see many of our schools getting involved and working with our children on this, allowing them the opportunity to think about prayer during this time. It was so nice to travel around the community and see the trees in various places, knowing that the town was covered in prayer - thank you to everyone who participated in this initiative.

Our FIG group worked extremely hard in sending out 195 hampers to families within our community just before Christmas. Thank you to all who supported this. The significant rise in numbers meant a lot more work, and shows the impact of the cost-of-living crisis upon our local community, please do keep the work of the FIG group in your prayers, as continued rise in demand means more funding is required, more volunteers etc. However, what a privilege to be able to support our community in this way, and to ensure that so many families have food on their tables for Christmas.

Father Christmas made visits to our Christmas fair, our family fun day, and to see Toms Tots - my goodness, what a busy fella he was in December! There were plenty of smiles around, and so many people in our community being welcomed into our Parish. Please do have a look at the videos on our social media. We really do have some excellent opportunities to share the light and love of Jesus, and this Christmas has really shown this, with the sheer numbers of people we have had through our doors. A huge, huge thank you to all of the volunteers who have helped in so many ways with all the community initiatives. The feedback from people visiting has been so positive, and when we think of our prayer for growth, I think of each and every member of our parish and the parts we play in reaching out to all these visitors (think about being a COG!), and the huge impact we can have - and I really do thank you all for your support with all the community work we are doing in order to continue growing our Parish.
